PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE OFFICER REPORT

2019 - 2020

As the financial year comes to a close and although the COVID-19 story has not fully run its course, I want to take the opportunity to acknowledge the efforts of the BCRG team throughout the past twelve months. This has been a year like no other and it has brought with it new and unpredicted challenges. Despite these challenges we have continued our commitment to strengthening individuals and families through responsive children's services, early intervention and community development programs and there have been great achievements and highlights. I am proud to present BCRG's 33rd Annual Report 2019 - 2020.

I encourage you to read each program report to see what great work our staff initiate and carry out within the community. Some highlights this year were the 2019 Community Reading Day at the Greenacre Community Centre that attracted a record number of people, with 204 children and 124 adults. Another highpoint was the Aboriginal Women's Health and Wellbeing Day which attracted over 70 Aboriginal women and a number of local health services.

BCRG continues to facilitate a range of Aboriginal programs including our long-standing Guring Gang Playgroup funded by Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) which has seen families grow and thrive over the years. We are pleased to report that the Community Development program and Aboriginal Playgroup have entered into a new contract with the DCJ which secures funding for Targeted Earlier Intervention for the next five years.

Congratulations to Julie Bertram,

ABSEC Conference. Staff presented on
the importance of linking the whole of

community at the ABSEC Conference and their presentation was very well received.

PRESCHOOL

Since June 2019 the preschool has been running at full capacity with 40 children enrolled per day and the employment of 3 additional educators. Our Preschool Director was successful in attaining funding from the Department of Education Community Grants program which allowed the employment of a Mandarin & Cantonese Bi-lingual support worker and the addition of a new cubby house for the children. The ongoing support we have received from the staff and Principal of Chester Hill Public School Mr Brent Kunkler has been central to the establishment and success of the service. We look forward to upgrading the outdoor environment next year with a new structural landscape design that we know the staff and children will love.

STRATEGIC PLAN

Throughout late 2019 and early 2020 staff and management worked with a strategic planning facilitator to develop a three year strategic plan for the organisation.

This is an exciting time of change for BCRG entering a three-year strategic planning phase 2020 - 2023. The three strategic priorities are to build an effective and sustainable organisation, become more flexible and dynamic and consolidate and grow high quality accessible services. Another priority is to equip staff and management with the tools necessary to support such strategic priorities. BCRG will continue to focus on governance and quality improvement in all areas of service delivery.

We know that this is an ever changing world and BCRG must position itself so that it can embrace growth opportunities and continue to deliver on its mission statement.

PBI AND DGR APPLICATION

As mentioned in the previous annual report, BCRG was working on an application to the Australian Charities and Notfor-profits Commission (ACNC) to be endorsed as a deductible gift recipient and public benevolent institution. With the valuable expertise of pro bono Lawyers Gilbert + Tobin, we made significant progress amending the current rules and objectives of our constitution, however we were later advised to withdraw the application and conduct a full review of our services, programs and documentation as this doesn't reflect what we do and the character/nature of the organisation. E.g. our constitution, website and terms and conditions relating to various services could be clearer in highlighting the need we are relieving and how. Moving forward BCRG will decide if we will go down this path in the future.

NDIS

As an NDIS provider it is essential that we meet the NDIS Practice Standards which provides a framework for disability service providers to understand what works effectively and what areas require improvement. In February 2020 BCRG underwent a desktop audit for NDIS Certification Stage 1 Audit against the NDIS Practice Standards. This is followed by a stage 2 audit, which is on-site and if the provider meets all requirements, they are awarded certification for three years. The initial desktop audit identified no major concerns. Due to COVID-19 the stage 2 audit was rescheduled for a remote certification visit later in the year. Certification is required for providers delivering more complex and/or higher risk supports and services, such as our registration group - Early Childhood Supports.

BCRG has learnt a great deal from the verification/audit experience in order to better meet the needs of both participants and the organisation. As an organisation and provider the comprehensive audit process ensures that we have good reliable quality management systems and internal measures are in place to comply with the NDIS Commission Practice Standards.

COVID OPERATIONS

BCRG strives to provide quality support services to the community, COVID-19 challenged the way we provided services at a time when the community needed assurance and support more than ever. COVID-19 forced us all to rethink the way we work, it required us to think of innovative and practical ways to continue to provide responsive support to the community. During this time staff demonstrated focus, flexibility, resilience and creativity, adjusted working styles and project plans. Developing new COVID-19 safe practices that were arduous at the best of times to meet the changing needs the impact of COVID-19 brought to the community services sector.

Throughout this time our aim was to keep all our staff and clients safe and continue to deliver important services to the community. Within a few days of a COVID-19 lockdown staff had organised regular phone support sessions and food packs which were delivered following COVID-19 safe protocols to people's homes if they were self-isolating due to health concerns or had issues with transportation. This has now become a regular part of the program with the distribution of Oz Harvest food bags fortnightly to the community from the BCRG office.

In terms 2 and 3 2020 many children were not attending preschool due to health concerns and educators adapted programs to be available from home via email. The preschool staff continued to work throughout the pandemic taking important COVID safe measures to keep children, families and themselves safe.

The Early Intervention team transitioned much needed supports to clients with disabilities through a Telehealth model and were able to continue supporting almost all families during this time. Staff

organised individual toys and resources to be dropped off or picked up from the office by parents to provide new activities for children during the lockdown period.

The Aboriginal Programs team offered regular phone calls, information and food hamper support as well as developing art/craft packs around various themes per term to students. To engage children and promote learning staff held a competition to encourage children to complete an activity "What culture Means to me" They even managed to surprise children with COVID safe birthday visits.

Looking ahead, this pandemic has offered us a chance to reset and look at how we do things leading to positive adaptations and new processes. New ways of working have emerged and these new approaches have revealed otherwise unknown personal strengths and growth. For individuals and organisations alike, we will take with us some valuable insights and powerful lessons for the future.

A big thank you to the staff who often go above and beyond to make things work. It has been a privilege to work with such a dedicated and skilled team at BCRG.

On behalf of the staff we would like to sincerely thank the BCRG Management Committee, Ali Mojtahedi, (President), Tim Carroll (Treasurer), Fran Glozier (Vice President and Secretary), Harry Allie (Member), Alison Purcell (Member), Janice Brooker (Member) and Vinh Trang (Member) who give their valuable time and expertise to guide and manage our organisation.

A special thank you and expression of gratitude to the community and families who use our services and we look forward to continuing to work with you.

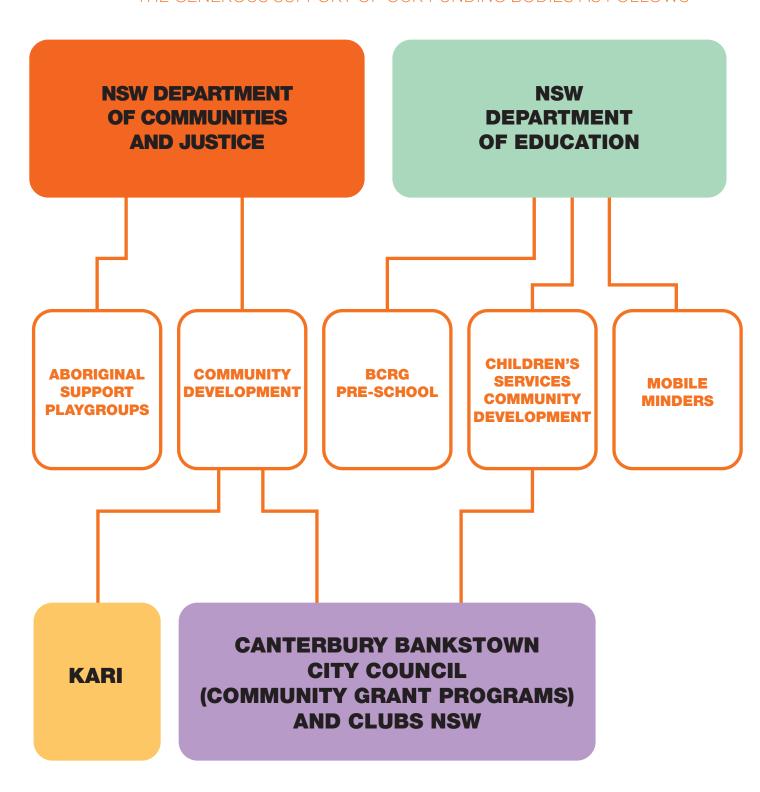

FUNDING BODY

Department of Education; since 2014

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

BCRG Mobile Minders has been operating in Bankstown since 1996 and provides flexible early education and care to the local community. The service provides outreach onsite childcare to Community and Government agencies that facilitate education, health and support programs for the local community. Many of the participants have children aged 0-6 years with limited access to childcare and would otherwise not be able to attend these programs. Mobile Minders allows parents/carers to actively engage in programs that will assist them to connect to the community, limit isolation and improve overall health and well-being for themselves and their families.

Mobile Minders and organisations work together to deliver programs that foster positive child and parent interaction and promote the importance of early education to parents. Mobile Minders value the importance of building trusting relationships with parents/carers and the significance of the discussions that occur between parent/carer and staff. Many of the conversations with families are about the importance of early childhood education, concerns with child development and relevant local community services. The Mobile Minders program further builds this understanding through the modelling of positive staff/ child interactions and the provision of educational activities reinforcing the information being provided to parents within the workshop.

Mobile MM staff program for different ages from 0-6 year's old, providing innovative, responsive and flexible forms of early childhood care and education guided by the Early Years Learning Framework allowing children to explore through play and create meaning.

BANKSTOWN SERVICE PROVISION JUNE 2019 - APRIL 2020

During July 2019 till March 2020 Mobile Minders undertook 181 sessions within the Canterbury Bankstown LGA. Our staff provided childcare services to 222 families and 287 individual children. Statistics reveal that 63.41% of children do not attend any form of childcare and 98% of these children were from a Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Background.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions many services had to cancel their groups particularly toward the end of Term 1 2020. At the beginning of Term 2 2020 bookings increased, however face to face sessions were later cancelled due to further COVOD-19 restrictions and the risk this posed to the community. During the lockdown period I took the opportunity to audit resources, add to the educational program and order new resources that will be used to enhance face to face sessions.

Mobile Minders worked closely with:

 The Multicultural Network (TMN), throughout the year, providing childcare for a range of different programs in their office: English Classes a Bankstown TAFE course, Vietnamese Citizenship, Chinese workshop and "The First 1000 days".

One-off session; "Keep Children Safe" was organised by TMN at Campsie PS and "Women's and Children sessions in Arabic" at the Bankstown HUB.

 Creating Links held a variety of parenting programs such as: Keeping Children Safe, 123 Magic, Circle of Security, Tunning into Kids and Triple P Lifestyle.

- VAWA organised Healthy Nutrition programs for parents.
- BCRG/ Community Development and Children's Services provided 123 Magic Parenting program at the Bankstown HUB.
- BCRG Community Development project, Aboriginal Women's Health and Wellbeing Day 2020.
- Revesby Uniting Care playgroups on Monday and Wednesday, welcoming more than 40 families.

MOBILE MINDERS -OUTSIDE OF LGA

Mobile Minders continues to provide mobile childcare outside of the Bankstown LGA, at a full fee for service. Throughout 2019 – 2020 Tresillian undertook a total of 18 sessions, providing services to 22 families and 22 children. Through the provision of Mobile Minders Tresillian was able to offer new parents parenting sessions on Saturdays so that both parents could attend.

PROFESSIONAL NETWORKS

The Bankstown Mobile Minders continued its involvement with the Mobile Children's Services Association of NSW (MCSA) and maintains close working relationship with similar mobile service providers.

EARLY INTERVENTION SERVICES



FUNDING BODY

National Disability Insurance Scheme and privately funded services.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

BCRG provide Speech Pathology and Occupational Therapy services for children 0-12 years with a diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder, Developmental Delay and other developmental disabilities.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

This year, thirty families received ongoing therapy services using a family centred approach. Each child and family was recognised for their unique strengths, and goals were focused on building on these existing strengths. Services were provided flexibly to support each family's situation, with therapists travelling to homes, schools and childcare centres, as well as offering services at the BCRG office.

Investment in a wider range of high quality therapeutic resources was made, and children are now enjoying and benefiting from these resources during their therapy sessions.

Moving therapy services to a Telehealth model during the COVID-19 shutdown was a challenge, but therapists were able to continue supporting almost all families during this time.

A focus has been placed on continuing to maintain partnerships with Early Childhood Early Intervention partners, Local Area Coordinators and other key partners such as schools, local therapy services to ensure each family is able to access appropriate services and activities.

PROJECT STAFF

Anna Certoma, Community Development Officer (CDO)

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The focus of the Community Development Project is to develop and implement community development activities that address identified local needs. The community development project works in collaboration with government and non-government agencies in the area to advocate for activities that promote community needs and interests. A key activity of this project is also to support and provide resources to existing community groups and co-ordinate social inclusion programs.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW JULY 2019 - JUNE 2020

PAINT BANKSTOWN RE(A)D

This early literacy community strategy is modelled on 'Paint the town REaD'. The CDO works in conjunction with the Bankstown Child and Family Interagency, Creating Links, Canterbury Bankstown Council, Chester Hill Neighbourhood Centre, Greenacre Area Community Centre and The Smith Family. These agencies have continued to work together on the implementation of this program in the Bankstown region in the 2019-2020 period.

The Paint Bankstown working party spent a number of months planning and coordinating the 2019 Community Reading Day which was held on the 11th September, at the Greenacre Community Centre. This was the first Reading Day we have held in the Greenacre area. We attracted a record number of people, with 124 adults and 204 children. There were

over 20 services present who were hosting a range of literacy and craft activities.

From early 2020 the working party has been planning the first on line Community Reading Day to be held in mid-September 2020. It will be a 20-30 minute program.

The CDO has also joined the Early Literacy Conference Planning committee. The committee is made up of members of Paint Bankstown REaD, Paint Liverpool REaD, Paint Fairfield REaD, Paint Canterbury REaD, and the Bankstown Child and Family Interagency. The Conference is planned for May 2021 and to be held at the Bankstown Sports Club.

COMMUNITY DRUG **ACTION TEAM**

In 2019-2020 the CDO has continued her role as Chairperson of the Bankstown Community Drug Action Team. Bankstown CDAT meets on a bimonthly basis.

In early 2020 Bankstown and Canterbury CDATs joined together to coordinate a drug and alcohol training for workers in the local government area. This two day training is scheduled for September 2020. The facilitator is Annie Bleeker, who has a wealth of experience in the field of drug and alcohol information.

CDAT members have also been planning an initiative for Mental Health Month in October 2020. We are joining forces with the Canterbury Bankstown Migrant Interagency and creating a local directory for Essential Services, and providing care packs for over 200 people in the local community who are experiencing a difficult time and requires assistance. Included in these packs will also be drug and alcohol resources and information.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROJECT CONTINUED



INCLUSIVE COMMUNITIES NETWORK

With the assistance of Canterbury Bankstown Council funding, the Inclusive Communities Network has continued its meetings and activities in 2019-2020. This project is in partnership with The Corner Youth Health Service. The focus of this network is to plan projects that will build the capacity of local services to be more inclusive of LGBTIQ community members. The ICN meetings are held bi-monthly. The chair of the Network is Jacob Steuart from Canterbury Bankstown City Council.

In 2019 the ICN coordinated Wear It Purple Day held on the 30th August. This is an annual LGBTIQA+ awareness day especially for young people, based in Australia. Supporters wear purple to celebrate diversity and young people from the LGBTIQA+ community. We had a pop up stall there from 2pm to 5pm and over 150 people engaged with the workers present. Services represented on the day included SSI, Headspace, Council and the Bulldogs.

The CDO joined the working party to host the first Inclusive Communities Networks Forum. The purpose of the forum is to bring together other local Inclusive Network members from South West and Western Sydney together for the first time. This took place in mid February and approx.70 workers and community members attended. The event was held at Liverpool Hospital Education Centre.

In May 2020 the ICN coordinated its first on line International Day Against Homophobia event. Over 150 tuned in from Canterbury Bankstown and beyond. We joined with ACON and Western Sydney University, to launch the report 'Home is where our story begins'. There was an array of speakers that formed part of the panel. There was a high level of engagement throughout the event with questions and comments.

The ICN also started planning for a social media campaign for Wear it Purple Day in August 2020.

SUPPORT FOR **COMMUNITY GROUPS**

ABORIGINAL WOMEN'S HOPE GROUP

The CDO continues to support the Aboriginal women's Hope group. In 2019-2020 the Hope group participated in a range of activities.

In August 2019 the Hope group joined the Vanuatu Women Cultural Exchange day hosted by Bankstown Women's Health Centre. In December 2019 the Hope group boarded the Nepean Belle River Cruise and had their Christmas Celebartory lunch. This was part funded by the particpiants.

In November we co-ordinated an excursion to Dress for Success at Marrickville for approx. 10 Aboriginal women.

On the 10th March the CDO co-ordinated an Aboriginal Women's Health and Wellbeing Day at the Bankstown Arts Centre. This event is funded by Clubs funding and attracted over 70 Aboriginal women. We had a number of local health services on the day engaging with women and the pamper activities were very popular.

From late March to June Hope group face to face meetings were suspended and the CDO made regular contact with each Hope group member to ensure that they were ok in this trying period. Food packs were delivered to the Hope group members' homes if transport was an issue and if the person was self-isolating due to health concerns. After lock down the CDO has continued the regular contact, and regularly receives Oz Harvest food bags which are distributed to community members from the BCRG office.

MALTESE OF BANKSTOWN

The Maltese of Bankstown group continued their monthly meetings and outings during 2019 - 2020 period up until the February 2020 meeting. The group was supported and resourced by the CDO project.

The CDO provided support by organising community guest speakers on the topics of Falls Injury Prevention and from Vision Australia. The CDO has also coordinated group excursions to Bundeena and the Malese Club at Wollongong in this reporting period.

The CDO thanks Canterbury Bankstown City Council's Ageing and Disability Officer and the Active Ageing Officer for their ongoing support for this group. This support has included relevant health and community information and resources for various mail outs to the group members and securing a suitable venue for the group's meetings.

SUPPORT FOR OTHER PROGRAMS

- The CDO continues her involvement with the Urana St (Villawood) Network. This network has a number of services working together to assist the residents of the Social Housing complex at Urana St. These services include Housing NSW, Salvation Army, Mission Australia, Woodville Alliance and Chester Hill Neighbourhood Centre.
- In this reporting period there have been two 'We All Care' Outreach days at Urana St. This took place in the Community Room in September 2019 and February 2020. This is where the local community members are provided with free clothes, groceries and toiletries from the 'We All Care' charity. Also, in July 2019 there was a NAIDOC community celebration held with over 80 people attending from the local community. Then in December 2019 the Network hosted a Villawood End of Year Christmas Community event with over 120 people.
- Doing it Differently (DID) Grants an initiative that started in South East Local Health District. The DID projecty offers funding to local community groups and services in order to reduce loneliness. BCRG, South West Sydney Local Health District and Canterbury Bankstown Council are coordinating this program and the funds are from Health and Council. All applicants were required to attend Asset Based Community Development Training in July. There is also a partnership with Western Sydney University to undertake research in relation to this program. Thus each funded group were required to agree to collect pre and post data.

- The CDO had assisted with the Black Santa Xmas party held in December 2019 at Revesby Uniting Church. Over 200 people, children and family members, attended the event. This project is part of the Deadly Beginnings, Deadly Futures project, funded by Communities for Children, Smith Family.
- The CDO provided support to the Koori Youth Project in partnership with The Corner Youth Heatlh Service. In January 2020 there was an excursion held for Aboriginal young people to Jamberoo Water Park. Approx 24 young people attended on the day.
- The CDO has supervised a Western Sydney University Masters in Social Work Student placement between July and November 2019.
- The CDO assumed the role of Resilience Project Advisory Committee member in conjunction with ACON and Western Sydney University

COMMUNITY EVENTS

In this reporting period the CDO Project has partnered with other community organisations/agencies to work on a range of community events. These events included:

- Bankstown Wellness Festival, October 2019 at Paul Keating Park. Over 30 local services took part in the event and all were required to provide an interactive wellbeing activity on the day. There was also entertainement provided.
- International Women's Day was held at the Bankstown Sports Club in March 2020. Approx. 220 local women came along to the event which had info stalls, speakers, performances and gift bags provided.
- Bankstown NAIDOC event at Paul Keating Park in July 2019
- Chester Hill Community Showcase stall holder, in October 2019

FUNDING BODY

Department of Communities and Justice

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

JULY 2019 - MARCH 2020

The Guring Gang Playgroup meets each Thursday between 10am and 12noon during school terms. The playgroup provides a safe, creative and supportive environment for parents/carers to engage in a range of culturally embedded experiences with their children and other families. There is a strong focus on literacy, development of social skills, arts, crafts and music. Each week we share lunch together. Playgroup provides a place for parents to support each other, share their knowledge and skills and connect to the wider community and services. The program is also linked to South West Sydney Health team who provide eight varied health session over the year.

MARCH 2020 - JULY 2020

When lock down occurred in March, a new work plan was developed which we adapted to quickly. This enabled ongoing support and activities to be provided for our families.

PROGRESS

We have had continued contact with 12 families, including 11 mums/carers, 3 dads, 2 grandparents, 12 girls and 8 boys throughout the year.

When we went into lockdown, we purchased each child an essentials art pack which gave all children access to quality art and craft resources. We have developed and delivered seven art and craft activity packs to each child at their home, enabled emergency relief

support through food hampers and provided surprise birthday visits. Parents have been kept up to date with relevant information and events via our packs and through our BCRG Facebook Page. Playgroup families show strong support and care for each other and this has been clearly evidenced throughout this Covid-19 time. Parents have remained connected via social media and phone calls. The children are always delighted to see us when we visit to deliver packs.

Over the period leading into closure we had visits from various organisations to share information with parents and the children. These include Centrelink, Housing and New Directions. Community Health and South Western Sydney Health workers attend regularly to promote healthy lifestyles. This year we have assisted families in a wide range of issues including food security, housing, educational concerns, funeral arrangements, letters of support, clothing, transport and concerns around accessing the NDIS.

We are thrilled that our funding from the Department of Communities and Justice will continue to July 2025.

Last year, three of our children left our program to attend school. All three of these children have settled into school and are doing very well. We continue to see these children through our homework club and Connect to Culture program.

Last year we submitted Abstracts to present at the National SNAICC Conference and the State ABSEC Conference. We were invited to speak at both conferences but due to financial limitations were only able to attend the ABSEC Conference which was held last November. Our presentation was very well received and we were fortunate to attend the conference for two days and hear about many wonderful projects occurring around NSW.

The Deadly Beginnings, Deadly Futures project is a suite of activities designed to continue educational, social and cultural support for children and their families as they transition from playgroups into primary school and then into High School. In 2019-2020 we have worked with 121 children aged 0-12 years. Of these, we have worked with 46 children on a weekly basis

- Connect to Culture

 Public School, Tuesdays
- Transition to High School Revesby YMCA Term 3, 2 day workshop
- Black Santa Community Event Revesby Uniting Church
- Cultural Excursions
 3 early years and 3 school aged excursions

KOORI HOMEWORK CLUB

The Koori Family Homework Club is held each Wednesday afternoon between 3pm-5:30pm. It is held for eight weeks each term. The sessions start with afternoon tea and a time of indoor or outdoor games. Children then complete homework or participate in a whole group activity around specific areas of need. Everyone enjoys dinner together before going home.

In Semester 2 last year we were fortunate to have 2 teaching students from the University of Western Sydney doing placement with us as part of their Classrooms without Borders course. They were a tremendous asset and we look forward to continuing to be a part of this WSU program.

DELIVERING DIFFERENTLY MARCH TO JULY

Due to COVID-19 restrictions and the lockdown period we continued to provide all children with essential packs (art supplies, scissors, glue and scrapbooks).

- Maintained contact with all families offering regular catch up phone calls, information and food hamper support.
- Provided three art/craft packs around various themes per term to students.
- Held a competition to encourage children to complete an activity "What culture Means to me" We had some wonderful entries and all children received a certificate and prize.
- Connected families to other culturally appropriate resources such as the KARI School Holiday Packs.
- · Surprised children with Birthday visits.

TRANSITION TO HS

In October, 11 students from 8 different schools attended a two day workshop which was held at Bankstown YMCA. The workshop provided children with an opportunity to discuss their expectations and concerns around High School and provided activities to build confidence around subjects, reading timetables, keeping diaries and organising homework. After the two days, all children reported that they felt more confident about attending High School had made new friends and enjoyed the variety of activities. Rock climbing facilitated by the YMCA was a highlight for all.

BLACK SANTA COMMUNITY EVENT

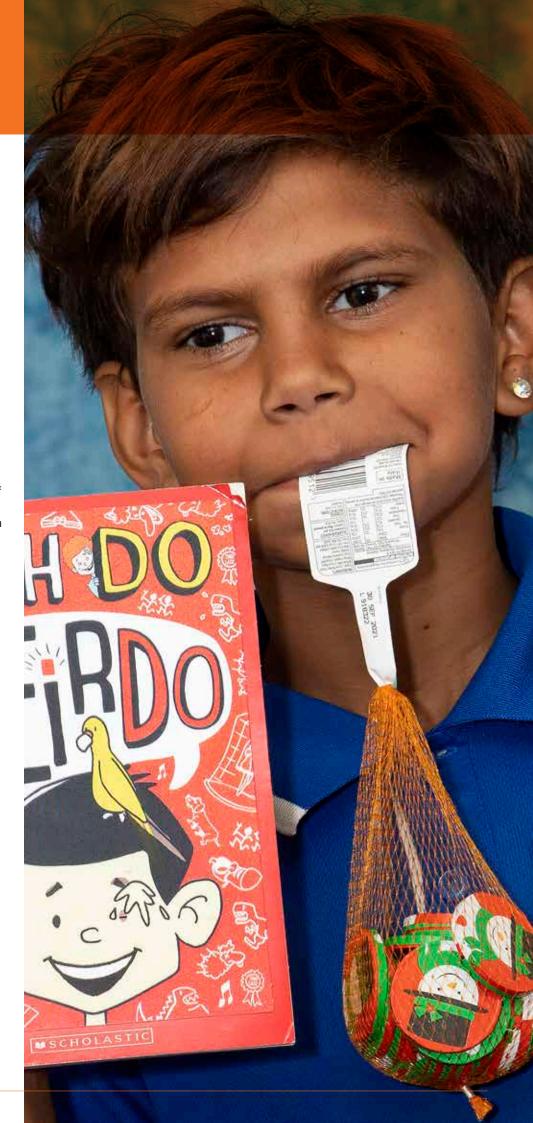

FUNDING BODY

Department of Education

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

In February 2018 the project applied to the Department of Education for the Start Strong Pathways funding, in which we were successful in attaining \$100,000 per annum. Initially the funding was from September 2019 till June 2020, however the Department of Education has extended the project from 1st July 2020 till 30th June 2021.

The Start Strong Pathways has three core objectives:

- Support educational engagement of children too young to receive a preschool education.
- Support pathways to preschool.
- Promote the importance of early childhood education to parents and communities.

This project is delivered across the formerly known Bankstown LGA to support the following vulnerable communities;

- Children with a disability,
- Children from an Aboriginal Background,
- Children from low income families,
- Children from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds,
- Children at risk from significant harm (from a child protection perspective),
- · Children from socially isolated families and;
- Children from geographically isolated families.

Projects undertaken by the Children Services Coordinator to achieve core objectives of funding for this financial year were:

BANKSTOWN CHILDREN AND FAMILIES HUB (BCFH)

This project has continued to support the Canterbury-Bankstown Council in delivering Friday weekly face to face activities and events at the BCFH with the support of the Child & Family Counsellor at Greencare Area Community Centre throughout 2019.

In line with the continual feedback received from parents the hub has continued to;

- Use the 3a Abecedarian Approach with links to the Early Years Learning Framework to provide early childhood learning experiences for children to participate with their parents/carers.
- Promote to parents the importance of the first 1000 days (0-2 years) through a range of resources kits and guest speakers from various health, community and early childhood education and care services.
- Role model strategies to parents to support children's early learning and development through delivery of evidence based programs.
- Delivering a range of parent information session on general and specific issues relating to accessing early educational and care services.
- Assisting individual families in transitioning children into early educational and care services. This process also supported referrals to other health, allied health and community services within the community.

In late 2019 the position at Canterbury-Bankstown Council Child & Family Community Development Officer was filled by Anita Pesa who is facilitating the BCFH as part of their portfolio. This project along with other services has continued to support Anita Pesa in

redeveloping the hub model in line with the changing needs of the community and respond to COVID 19 by;

- Delivery of evidence based parenting programs which included:
 - o 1-2-3 Magic & Emotion Coaching-A series of 2 hour sessions over a course of 3 weeks were delivered with Hannah Watters (Greenacre Area Community Centre's Child & Family Counsellor) on the 21st Feb, 28th Feb and 6th March 2020. BCRG's Mobile Minders was ustilised to provide onsite child minding for parents attending the parenting program.
 - o The Incredible Years: Attentive Parenting (online)- A series of 1.5 hour sessions over the course of 2 weeks were delivered on the 5th, 12th May from 10.30am- 12.00 and 15th, 22nd June 2020 from 7pm-8.30pm. This program focused strongly on how parents can use child-directed play and interactive reading to support their child's school readiness.
 - Bringing Up Great Kids: The First 1000 Days (online) - A series of 2 hour weekly sessions over the course of 5 weeks were delivered with Hannah Watters (Greenacre Area Community Centre's Child & Family Counsellor) on 26th May, 2nd, 9th, 16th 23rd June 2020, 11:30 -1:30pm.
- Developing 80 children packs which included a range of children activities and parent information of local service and support. These packages where distributed through BCRG, Chester Hill Neighbourhood Centre, Coolabaroo Neighbourhood Centre, The Smith Family and Villawood Alliance.

PARENT-CHILD MOTHER GOOSE (P-CMG) PROGRAM

The Parent-Child Mother Goose program embraces families from all backgrounds providing a valuable resource to first time parents and experienced parents alike. This program promotes parent-child relationships through the sharing of songs, rhymes and storytelling fun of oral language experiences. The program has been proven to be beneficial to children's development, particularly in communication, knowledge, social-emotional skills.

The P-CMG program was implemented at;

- The Bankstown Children and Families Hub every Friday throughout 2019.
- Greenacre Area Community Centre Playgroup every Wednesday in the first school term in 2020. Unfortunately the sessions ended in mid-March due to COVID 19 mandatory shut down.

Overall the sessions were highly successful at both these sessions. The majority of children attending these sessions were between ages of were between the ages of 1.5-3 years. It was also pleasing to see that there was high number of fathers participating in some of these sessions held at GACC. Many of the parents also enjoyed sharing songs, rhymes and oral stories from their own CALD backgrounds.

INDIVIDUAL CHILD AND FAMILY SUPPORT DURING COVID-19

During COVID-19 this project continued to support children and families by providing;

- One to one play sessions over Zoom for parents requiring assistance to support their children's early learning and development in every day routines at home.
- Support in exploring early childhood education options that best meets their child's needs.

- Information and referral to preschool and other support services such as speech pathologists and occupational therapists.
- Development of children/parent fun packs.

BANKSTOWN CHILD AND FAMILY INTERAGENCY (BCFI)

The Children's Services Coordinator has continued to attend the BCFIG bi-monthly meetings and actively participated in a number of community development initiatives through its established working parties which have included:

Stay & Play

This is an initiative involves monthly play sessions at Bankstown Central from 10.30am – 12pm. The aim of these sessions is to engage families in a neutral venue that they already visit. The play sessions operate similar to a playgroup in that a range of activities are available for young children to participate in with their parents/careers. Workers from a range of services are available to engage with parents/carers and children to:

- Discuss about the importance of early learning/skills for starting school including reading with young children every day from birth.
- Provide information and referral to local support services as needed.

Stay and play sessions have also provided a platform to celebrate Families Week, Children's Week and Child Protection Week.

In 2019 the Children's Services
Coordinator has attended each month,
linking families to the Bankstown Children
& Families Hub as well as providing
information and referrals to different types
of early childhood education and care
services, as well as, early childhood
intervention services.

In 2020, during COVID-19 this project continued to support the working party in the planning the delivery of Stay and Play sessions via Zoom. These Zoom sessions are scheduled to be delivered on the 15th September, 20th October and 17th November from 10am till 11am.

Canterbury-Bankstown Playgroup Network

Over the years this network supported playgroups in the Canterbury–Bankstown region through a range of professional development events.

In 2020 the Children's Services
Coordinator supported the network
to plan the delivery of a professional
development event for CanterburyBankstown playgroup workers and
volunteers. This event will be held via
Zoom on the 28th August 2020, focusing
on practical strategies to support children
and their families during COVID 19.

Other networks and events that this project participated in included;

- 3A Abecedarian Approach Network.
- The Paint the Town REaD Community Reading Day at Greenacre Area Community Centre, 11th September 2019.
- Chester Hill Twilight Service Showcase at Chester Hill Public School, 26th October 2019.

FUNDING BODY

Department of Education

The NSW State Government subsidises preschool fees to lower the daily fee charged by the preschool to families.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

BCRG Chester Hill Preschool for 3-5 year old children, and is based on a play based curriculum which reflects from The Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF). This curriculum is interest based and child focused and views children as being independent, competent and capable learners who have control of their own learning and environment. Each child's current knowledge, strengths, ideas, abilities and interests are the foundation of the program.

Our Educators are strong advocates of children's learning and the importance of intentional teaching through play for the foundation of learning in early childhood. The educator's role model age appropriate experiences and inform the benefits of learning through play to the families. Professional development and training for educators is an ongoing process and considered an important part of our reflective practice. This is achieved through staff supervision, professional development training opportunities and regular staff meetings. Through the EYLF program educators foster creativity and problem solving in children and are actively engaged in developing confident and involved learners.

The main principle that underpins BCRG service practice is the importance of relationships with the children, families and the community with whom we work. BCRG Preschool adopts a strength based and person centred approach to working with children and families. BCRG Chester Hill Preschool emphasises an inclusive environment where children build a sense of belonging and are encouraged to play, discover and

learn. We are a diverse community and reflect this in our program. The preschool has specially designed indoor and outdoor spaces and encourages children to explore and learn within a nurturing environment.

BCRG undertakes an annual Preschool census and adheres to the Start Strong funding principals with the aim to reduce fees for children from low income families. The aim is to improve affordability of early childhood education and increase the number of children participating in a quality early childhood education program in the year before school.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

- It has been a challenging year due to the impact of COVID-19. Many children were not attending preschool due to health concerns in Term 2 & 3, and educators had to adapt our program and offer it to children learning from home via email.
- We were successful in our Department of Education Community Grants program application which allowed us to employ a Mandarin & Cantonese Bilingual support worker to assist in settling in children from Chinese backgrounds, and help staff communicate effectively with families in translating verbally, and written documents in Chinese.
- We added a Cubbyhouse to our playground funded through the Department of Education's Quality Environment Program.
- Additional programs were offered to the children to extend our educational program through successful grant submissions from the Department of Education. They included; children's puppet performances, a two week chicken egg hatching program, weekly kids Yoga classes in Term 1 of 2020, weekly sports program in Term 4.

Note 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies (Cont.)

(b) Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.
