### PRESIDENT & EXECUTIVE OFFICER REPORT

### 2021 - 2022

It is with pleasure that we present our 35th Annual Report for 2021-2022. This year we transitioned into a new normal, taking the knowledge and wisdom of the last two years and adjusting to the challenges of COVID-19. This saw innovative delivery of services through virtual and hybrid delivery models. New services and supports were developed including emergency food relief for those in quarantine or experiencing hardship.

With the assistance of the Department of Communities and Justice Regional Partnerships Grant and Canterbury Bankstown Council funding, the Community Development Officer and Aboriginal Programs team played a significant role in supporting families over this period, providing food hampers and other forms of emergency relief.

I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge the efforts of the BCRG team throughout the year. Despite challenges, we have continued our commitment to strengthening individuals and families through responsive children's services, early intervention and community development programs and there have been great achievements and highlights.

Some highlights this year have been the quick action on behalf of program staff to develop quality resource packs for children and families, cultural, educational and fun packs delivered to schools, playgroups and community organisations. Other great initiatives included the Community Reading Week activities and a multilingual project 'Celebrating Children, Cultures and Languages', Positive Partnerships' online workshops and the continuation of BCRG's Playgroup in the park.

We encourage you to read each program report to see what great work staff initiate and carry out within the community.

### STRATEGIC PLAN

In 2023, BCRG will begin a new and exciting strategic plan phase and whilst we have made progress throughout the 2020-2023 Strategic plan, we have also had to shift direction due to the pandemic. The strategic plan is focused on consolidating processes and activities to ensure sustainable operations, while still allowing for innovation, growth and continued connection with the community. The strategic priorities are to build strong communities, focusing on children, young people and their families, to enhance their independence, safety, self-esteem and quality of life, so that the community is better informed, resourced and connected with increased social capital and resilience.

A main focus this year has been to strengthen the early intervention services through staff recruitment, this has however proven challenging due to the shortage of Speech Pathologists and Occupational Therapists across the allied health sector. BCRG has improved our technology systems with a new backup system and computer upgrades as well as plans in progress to install NBN cabling in the preschool.

BCRG will increase our brand recognition with a website upgrade in 2023. We will also look at our current operational processes and enhance professional development so that our team is supported to do their best work.

### **PRESCHOOL**

In mid-June BCRG Chester Hill
Preschool underwent an Assessment &
Rating process where the service was
rated against 7 quality areas within the
National Quality Standard. They received
Exceeding in Quality Area 1 Educational
Program and Practice, and Quality Area 3
Physical environment. The overall rating
for the service was Meeting the national
Quality Standard. Considering we are
only 5 years old this is a great outcome
and a credit to the team.

The establishment of the BCRG Chester Hill Preschool was the inspiration and long term goal of our much loved Rebecca Galea (Executive Officer 2001 - 2013) to one day establish a community based Preschool and to extend our services to the education and care of children aged 3-6 years. To pay tribute to Rebecca and her work with the community, particularly Aboriginal programs and the establishment of the preschool, we asked Shareen Clayton, an Aboriginal artist who worked at BCRG and knew Rebecca to paint this story in acknowledgement of the wonderful contribution and work Rebecca leaves as a legacy for the community.

### EARLY INTERVENTION SERVICES AND NDIS

As a NDIS provider it is essential that we meet the NDIS Practice Standards which provides a framework for disability service providers to understand what works effectively and what areas require improvement. In October 2020, the Early Intervention team successfully completed the Stage 2 NDIS Practice Standards audit with QIP. BCRG has learnt a great deal from the verification/audit experience in order to better meet the needs of both participants and the organisation and will undergo a NDIS midterm audit in 2022.

### **FAREWELL**

In March this year we said goodbye to two long standing staff, Julie Bertram (14 years) and Renee Chalmers (7.5 years). Julie and Renee have initiated many programs and events for children and families in Bankstown and have been an asset to the community and to BCRG. They are genuine, hardworking, passionate, and thoughtful. This is evident in the relationships they have built with children, families and community over many years. Julie and Renee have watched and supported many children grow from babies to primary and high school - what an incredibly rare experience to have. Both Julie and Renee presented at national, state, and local conferences about their programs and most importantly about the way they worked with children and families and the importance of listening to people and being authentic. At a recent Paint Bankstown Read Conference where Julie and Renee presented a cultural awareness workshop and a number of attendees reported that the workshop was one of the best workshops they have ever attended. This is a testament to the knowledge and skill of the staff. In 2017

Julie received and shared the award for Outstanding Community Leader with her team.

I hope they know how much their work is valued and the indelible legacy they have left on the children, families, and colleagues they have worked with. They will be very much missed, and we wish them the very best in this new chapter of their lives.





### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

BCRG Mobile Minders has been operating in Bankstown since 1996, providing outreach onsite childcare to Community and Government agencies that facilitate education, health and support programs for the local community. Mobile Minders works cooperatively with many agencies to allow parents / carers to actively engage in programs that will assist them to connect to the community and limit isolation.

Mobile Minders support the educational engagement of 0-6 years' old, specifically 0-3's who are too young to receive preschool education. In recognition of a child's first experience in separating from their parents / carers, mobile minder staff aim to create a safe, nurturing and educational environment where children feel comfortable & secure enough to play, explore and learn. as well develop positive self-esteem and increase confidence and competence in learning.

This experience promotes pathways to early childhood education as parents/ carers recognise the development and social benefits of early childhood education for their child. Programmed activities include art/ craft, construction, dramatic play, puzzles, multicultural experiences, music and language. Our annual Mobile Minders Survey results indicate that children have improved separation, increased social and group participation as well as improved confidence.

### BANKSTOWN SERVICE PROVISION JULY 2021 - JUNE 2022

At the end of June 2021 NSW went through another COVID-19 lockdown enforcing all face to face sessions through term 3 and 4 to be canceled. Agencies used virtual ways to run their sessions. For Mobile Minders to continue to reach children and families and provide supports to them through this difficult time, we developed one hundred "Transition to school" packs. These were delivered to families through agencies, BCRG preschool and playgroups. These packs included information for parents from the Department of Education, Be You, Health and Let's Read. Packs also included books for children, counting cubes and activities to do with parents or siblings. We were able to reach 100 families through BCRG Guring Gang and Children's Services Start Strong Playgroup, Chester Hill Preschool, Creating Links, VAWA and BCRG Early Intervention team.

Although Mobile Minders service provision was impacted significantly by COVID-19 we were able to provide direct fact to face services in term 2 2022, undertaking 37 sessions within the Canterbury Bankstown LGA. The Mobile Minders staff provided childcare to 49 families and 55 individual children. Statistics reveal that 85.5% of these children do not attend any form of childcare and 99% of these children were from a Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Background.

### MOBILE MINDERS -OUTSIDE OF LGA

Mobile Minders continues to provide mobile childcare outside of the Bankstown LGA, at a full fee for service. Tresillian stopped face to face sessions in term 3 only and undertook a total of 65 sessions, continuing to provide a Post Natal Depression Support and Circle of Security program for 45 families, first time parents and 49 children. With the help of MM, Tresillian could offer new parents parenting sessions on Saturday so both parents were able to attend this critical program.

I would like to thank all the Mobile Minder staff who always work so hard to offer children the best opportunities of learning through play.

A very special thank you to Menal Ahmed who has worked with BCRG Mobile Minders since 2005. Menal has spent the past 17 years caring for children in our community, she always showed dedication and care to her role and has decided to finish her journey with MM, we wish her all the very best for the future and thank her for her commitment.

### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

BCRG provide Speech Pathology and Occupational Therapy services for children 0-16 years with a diagnosis of Autism Spectrum Disorder, Developmental Delay and other developmental disabilities. Most families access supports through the National Disability Insurance Scheme or privately funded using Medicare management plan rebates.

### **PROGRAM OVERVIEW**

This year, 40 children and young people accessed BCRG's speech pathology and occupational therapy services. The goals and outcomes focused on drawing upon the strengths of the child and family. During lockdown, services were adapted to ensure continuity of care was provided to each family's individual circumstances. This included the provision of telehealth sessions, coaching with parents/caregivers and the provision of home resources packs. Face to face services resumed from February 2022, and most families are now accessing face to face supports in the BCRG office, at school/childcare or at home. The Early Intervention team were also involved in the planning and delivery of a number of projects. This included the delivery and content review of Positive Partnerships' online workshop and webinars; in addition to the delivery of online information sessions and workshops, which was funded through the Social Sector Support Funds from the Department of Communities and Justice. The Social Sector Support Funds also involved the provision of resource packs, and a total 41 families accessed these supports. Families reported: "The resources were age appropriate and supported my sons learning needs. Through the use of the resources, we were able to foster language, social and emotional developmental needs."

### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The focus of the Community
Development Project is to develop and implement community development activities that address identified local needs. The community development project works in collaboration with government and non-government agencies in the Bankstown area to advocate for and implement activities that promote community needs and interests. A key activity of this project is also to support and provide resources to existing community groups and coordinate social inclusion programs.

### PROGRAM OVERVIEW JULY 2021 - JUNE 2022

### PAINT BANKSTOWN RE(A)D

This early literacy community strategy is modelled on 'Paint the town REaD'. The CDO works in conjunction with the Bankstown Child and Family Interagency, Creating Links, Canterbury Bankstown Council, Chester Hill Neighbourhood Centre and The Smith Family. These agencies have continued to work together on the implementation of this program in the Bankstown region in the 2021-2022 period.

The Paint Bankstown working party transformed the traditional Community Reading Day into a Community Reading Week in November 2021. Creating Links staff did a live reading of Bongo's Big Day Out and sang songs. Bankstown Library staff did a Reader's Theatre on line. Each day of the Community Reading Week we

shared Facebook posts that promoted early literacy programs and events in the Bankstown area. The working party also assembled and distributed over 80 book bags to children under school age in the local area.

In February 2022 we coordinated a project called, 'Celebrating Children, Cultures and Languages'. This multilingual project, funded by Canterbury Bankstown City Council and partnered with Think + Do in Fairfield. Eight community members were trained as story tellers for a nine week period. The participants were keen to continue the project, and after the workshops they joined the Forked Tongues Storytelling event in Fairfield. This allowed the participants to meet and listen to other Storytellers from the Fairfield area.

Images of the participants accompanied with positive early literacy and bilingualism messages, will be used on social media in the next financial year.

### COMMUNITY DRUG ACTION TEAM


In 2021-2022 the CDO has continued her role as Chairperson of the Bankstown Community Drug Action Team.
Bankstown CDAT meets on a bimonthly basis.

In August 2021 CDAT ran a social media campaign for Overdose Awareness Day. The large screens at Bankstown Central were also used to promote messages in relation to Overdose Awareness Day.

Bankstown CDAT and Canterbury CDAT have partnered to provide Preventure Program training for community workers in the Canterbury Bankstown area. The program is a school based intervention program aimed at reducing adolescent drug and alcohol use in high-risk teenagers. The first round of training was offered in June 2022.

### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CONTINUED







### **INCLUSIVE COMMUNITIES** NETWORK (ICN)

With the assistance of Canterbury Bankstown Council and ACON funding, the Inclusive Communities Network has continued its meetings and activities in 2021-2022. The focus of this network is to plan projects that will build the capacity of local services to be more inclusive of LGBTIQ community members. The ICN meetings are held bi-monthly. The chair of the Network was Jacob Steuart from Canterbury Bankstown City Council.

Wear it Purple Day takes place in late August each year. It's a chance for the whole community - LGBTIQ people and their allies, to show support and celebrate the spirit of LGBTIQ youth. In 2021 the Bankstown ICN put together care packs for 40 young people who identify as LGBTIQ in the area. These packs were delivered to each young person during a strict lockdown period.

A Western Sydney Inclusive Communities Network website has been created and provides information on the local ICN and other similar networks across the Greater Western Sydney area, and relevant LGBTIQ information. There is also a Facebook page set up called the LGBTQ Inclusion Networks - Greater Western Sydney, which the local ICN contributes to.

The ICN planned an event for International Day Against Homophobia (IDAHOBIT) which is usually in May of each year. In 2022 we held the event in July. The panel event planned to explore intersectionality among the community of South Western Sydney and would be open to all.

### SUPPORT FOR **COMMUNITY GROUPS**

### ABORIGINAL WOMEN'S HOPE GROUP

The CDO continues to support the Aboriginal women's Hope group.

The Hope group restarted monthly face to face meetings at the end of 2021. The meetings have been held at Wellama, the Aboriginal Community Health Centre at Bankstown.

The Hope group were provided with Clubs NSW funds for an Aboriginal Women's Retreat. This retreat, Koori Women on Country, took place on the 4, 5, 6 May 2022 at Wollombi. Nine women attended the retreat. The three days were facilitated by Leanne King who is a local at Wollombi. The facilitator showed the ladies some local culturally significant sites, did a bush tucker walk and talk, and talked about the history and art of the area, and local Aboriginal stories connected with the region.

Some of the Hope group members, many of whom are elders, have also been receiving home deliveries of Oz Harvest food bags, in this financial year.

### COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CONTINUED

### MALTESE OF BANKSTOWN

The CDO has continued to support the Maltese of Bankstown group. In December 2021, the Maltese group were invited for a Christmas lunch at the Maltese Club. La Valette. This was after months of isolation from one and other. Since then, meetings and outings have been regular. Some of the Maltese group members have been attending some of the Council Information Sessions such as Reconnecting Morning Tea and the Wellbeing and Safety Information Day. In June 2022 the group visited the Southern Highlands..

### SUPPORT FOR OTHER PROGRAMS / INITIATIVES

- First Nations Youth Project in partnership with The Corner Youth Health Service and Canterbury Bankstown City Council. The CDO and partners have been planning to restart a First Nations Youth program in 2022-2023.
- Food bags BCRG had been receiving Oz Harvest food bags, fortnightly, and distributing those to community members, either by pick up at the office or home delivery. Emergency Relief Funds - distribution to Aboriginal community members care of Canterbury Bankstown City Council and Department of Communities and Justice, COVID 19 Relief Grant.
- Emergency Relief the funds were care of Canterbury Bankstown Council and Dept of Communities and Justice - COVID 19 Grant. BCRG provided local community with emergency relief in the form of vouchers for groceries, Office works, and paying for other items desperately needed by community members. The CDO also was able to assist people with registering items needed on the GIVIT website. which matches needs with donations.

- Also, through this funding BCRG has been able to fund the Breakfast Club at Birrong Boys High School in early 2022. Emergency Relief funds were also used to coordinate an Aboriginal Women's Gathering Camp. This was in conjunction with Dept of Communities and Justice, SWS Local Health District, Wingecarribee Shire Council, and Highlands Community Centre, and took place in late June. 23 Aboriginal women from Bankstown and the Highlands area attended.
- Urana St (Villawood) Network. This network has a number of services working together to assist the residents of the Social Housing complex at Urana St, and Villawood at large. These services include the Department of Communities and Justice, Mission Australia, Salvation Army, Woodville Alliance and Chester Hill Neighbourhood Centre. During lockdowns in 2021 the CDO assisted with distributing Oz harvest food bags to Villawood residents, as well as emergency relief funds in the form of vouchers.

### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Guring Gang Playgroup meets each Thursday between 10am-12noon in school terms. The playgroup provides a safe, creative, and supportive environment for parents/carers to engage in a range of culturally embedded experiences with their children and other families. There is a strong focus on language and literacy development, social skills, art, craft and music. Playgroup provides a place for parents to support each other, share their knowledge and skills and connect to the wider community and services.

### **OVERVIEW**

This has been a most challenging year for our playgroup with the continued lockdowns. Despite fewer face to face events this year, we have maintained contact with 11 children and their families.

We have kept families informed via the BCRG Facebook page and made regular well-being phone calls. At the commencement of stay at home orders, we phone surveyed families regarding how we could best assist them. Over the course of the year, we were able to assist families in a range of ways.

We delivered food hampers to families both through PCYC and BCRG programs. These were well received by families. Through BCRG, families were able to access food vouchers to the value of \$150 if required.

As parents were unable to attend playgroup, we delivered playgroup activities to them. We developed two culturally embedded art/ craft and educational packs, each containing a wide range of activities for parents to do with their children. Each pack included over 12 ready-made activities, educational games, instructions for the parents and all the required materials to complete activities.

In December we had a Christmas gathering at the office. The children and parents enjoyed seeing each other and all children received a certificate, a Christmas gift which was donated by a generous secret Santa and a goodies bag. Two of our children received KARI transition to school back packs and resources and another resource bag from BCRG.

A highlight of the morning was a presentation of flowers to a parent who was with us for her final day after attending Guring Gang for over 13 years. We look forward to seeing her at our primary programs.

We were able to assist a parent in various ways throughout the period including written referrals, letters of support and we assisted a parent Ito access placement for her two children in a preschool for three days a week.

Throughout the year both facilitators attended a wide range of Zoom meetings, playgroup forums and training.

In February/March of 2022, both Renee Chalmers and Julie Bertram resigned from their positions. These positions have now been filled. 4

Despite being unable to run our face-toface programs in our projects, we feel we have maintained strong connections with our families, and we have been in continued discussions with our schools around the best way to implement our programs. We have continued to provide high quality, culturally embedded resources to students, staff and families and have maintained connection with well-being calls to families. We have been able to provide food hampers and vouchers to families who have requested them.

In February /March of this year both Julie and Renee resigned from their positions. The Connect to Culture program finished when the current contract expired in June 2022

### **FAMILIES LEARNING TOGETHER**

This group was to commence in July 2021. Unfortunately, due to covid restrictions and staffing issues, this group did not meet face to face in its weekly format. We have continued to support our 4 families through phone calls and shared information on Facebook.

In terms 3 and 4, the families received packs which had resources for the children, and also games and activities for families to play together. These included educational games, board games, craft, books and cooking activities.

We were able to have an end of year gathering and held a Pizza Presentation Party which took place outdoors at our office. The children received a gift from a generous donor, a goodie bag and a certificate.

One of our students who had been with our program since it began, moved into High school. He received a special award which was a book of Indigenous Art and a KARI Transition to HS backpack. All children and parents thoroughly enjoyed the afternoon.



### DEADLY BEGINNINGS, DEADLY FUTURES PROJECT CONTINUED

In March of 2022 we held a Crafternoon. The children had a special afternoon tea, played games and did craft. This event also served as an opportunity for both Julie and Renee to say goodbye and thank you to the children, youth and families they had been working with for many years.

Two new employees, Kristie Montesin and Bernie Compton, were appointed in May and July 2022.

### CONNECT TO CULTURE

We were unable to present our program in schools in terms 3 or 4 of 2021 due to guidelines around covid. Instead, we once again developed resource packs which included games, arts/crafts, a book and activities that could be done by the family. These were delivered to the children's homes.

In term 4 we registered for the First Nations Bedtime Story Event. This is done through Common Ground, and it sends us links to five story telling sessions along with educational resources for specific age groups. Links to this excellent resource were sent to each school. This allowed all children and staff across the school to have access to these stories and resources.

Schools were informed of an online workshop around language, which Chester Hill North did with their students for a session each week.

Each child received an activity booklet, Fostering Little People's Culture. This included parent information about helping children to be Strong, Smart, Deadly which was a constant theme around our program.

As we were not able to have our usual presentation day, we made up presentation packs for 21 children and delivered them to the schools. These included a photo of the child, a certificate, a present donated by a secret Santa and a goodies bag. We were

unable to see the children at Villawood East but were able to see children collect bags from the office at Chester Hill North. Covid security was very tight.

In term 1, 2022, after discussions with both schools, it was decided to hold off on face to face programs until term 2. We delivered 27 culturally embedded packs to the school. Each child received a folder with 12 activities with all resources and instructions included. Schools were also given two teacher copies of these resources, as Chester Hill North continued to meet with the group which was led by the Principal or a staff member. They sent regular photos and updates to us for our evaluation purposes. The Connect to Culture Program ceased in schools in June 2022.



As we were unable to attend any excursions last year, funds were diverted to develop high quality resource packs.

An excursion was held in the June school holidays 2022 for pre-school children and their families. This was a very successful day at Calmsley Hill Farm, and it was a wonderful opportunity to bring our community together after a long time apart. A number of new families also attended the day.

### **COMMUNITY EVENT**

We were unable to hold a large community event due to concerns around covid and staff changes.

### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Start Strong Pathways has been delivered by BCRG since September 2019 through a range of activities, with the aim to:

- support educational engagement of children too young to receive a preschool education
- support pathways to preschool
- promote the importance of early childhood education to parents and communities

This project is delivered across the formerly known Bankstown LGA to support the following vulnerable communities;

- Children with a disability,
- Children from an Aboriginal Background,
- Children from low income families,
- Children from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds,
- Children at risk from significant harm (from a child protection perspective),
- Children from socially isolated families and;

Children from geographically isolated families.

Projects undertaken by the Children Services Coordinator to achieve core objectives of funding for this financial year were:

### INDIVIDUAL CHILD AND FAMILY SUPPORT

In 2021 - 2022, this project continued to support children and their families through Zoom, phone and email by providing;

- One to one play sessions for parents requiring assistance to support their children's early learning and development in every day routines at home.
- Support in exploring early childhood education options that best meets their child's needs
- Information and referral to preschool and other support services such as speech pathologists and occupational therapists.

Also, in collaboration with BCRG's Mobile Minders project, School Readiness/
Transition to School packs were developed and distributed to families with preschool aged children.



### CHILDREN'S SERVICES CONTINUED

### BCRG'S PLAYGROUP IN THE PARK (0-4YEARS) TERM 1 & 2 2022

Early childhood educators from BCRG's Mobile Minders Program assisted in the delivery of the playgroup on a weekly basis. The early childhood educators were instrumental in programming in line with the Early Years Learning Framework and the 3a Abecedarian Approach Program

Due to covid-19 lockdowns in terms 3 and 4 2021, playgroup was run weekly via Zoom. Although this was a challenging time and attendance numbers were lower than face to face playgroup, regular families continued to attend. Playgroup in the park was run for 6 sessions throughout terms 1 and 2 in 2022. The majority of children attending the playgroup were from the ages of 2-4 years, from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.

Overall, the feedback from families has been extremely positive and we are continually receiving referrals from new families wishing to attend our playgroup.

### PARENTING PROGRAMS

In term 3 2021, The Incredible Years: School Readiness parenting program, a 6 week program was delivered via Zoom. Overall, these sessions were successful with 97% of parents indicating a significant increase in their skills to promote preschool children's school readiness. The objectives are to improve children's school readiness by enhancing their language, reading, and social skills.

### SING&GROW

In 2021 BCRG were successful in receiving a Club Grant to collaborate with Sing&Grow Australia to provide an evidence-based, national music therapy programs for young children (0-5 years old) and their families living in Bankstown

who present with complex needs. These music therapy programs focus on strengthening family relationships, building capacity in parents to support their children's development in the early years of life, and encouraging the use of music within communities.

In term 2, 2022 8 sessions of Sing&Grow were run at the Bankstown Knowledge Centre. A series of Sing & Grow Family Workshops will be run in term 3.

### INTERAGENCIES AND WORKING PARTIES

The CSCDO project continues to actively participate through Zoom in the bi-monthly Bankstown Child & Family Interagency meetings and its working parties. The work undertaken by the CSCDO in each of the working parties have included;

### Canterbury-Bankstown Playgroup Network

This network aims to support playgroup workers in the Canterbury–Bankstown region through a range of professional development events. Overall, these professional development events provide opportunities to connect with other playgroup workers and share ideas and practices.

### AEDI/ Transition to School Working Party

The Stay and Play initiative, that initially involved local services engaging parents/carers and their children in monthly play sessions at Bankstown Central from 10.30am – 12pm to:

- Discuss the importance of early learning/skills for starting school including reading with young children every day from birth.
- Provide information and referral to local support services as needed.

Stay and play sessions have also provided a platform to celebrate Families Week, Children's Week and Child Protection Week.

In 2021, during COVID-19 this project continued to support the working party in the co-planning and co-delivery of Stay and Play sessions via Zoom.

### Canterbury-Bankstown Child Protection Network

This newly established network is convened by Ebony Blewitt (Creating Links-Manager Child and Family Services), aims to support community service providers to respond to child protection matters in ways that uphold dignity on behalf of the BCFI. Staff of this project has been participating in the bi-monthly meetings since the beginning of 2021.

This project also participated in The Smith Family Bankstown Communities for Children Initiatives. These initiatives have included the;

- 3a Abecedarian Approach Practitioner Network
- Schools and Communities Working Together Project

### PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

BCRG Chester Hill Preschool for 3-5 year old children, and is based on a play based curriculum which reflects from The Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF). This curriculum is an educational play based program which views children as being independent, competent and capable learners who have control of their own learning and environment. Each child's current knowledge, strengths, ideas, abilities and interests are the foundation of the program.

Our Educators are strong advocates of children's learning and the importance of intentional teaching through play for the foundation of learning in early childhood. The educator's deliver age appropriate experiences and learning opportunities, and inform the benefits of learning through play to the families. Professional development and training for educators is an ongoing process and considered an important part of our reflective practice. This is achieved through staff supervision, professional development training opportunities and regular staff meetings. The program is informed by the Early Years Learning Framework. Our educators foster creativity and problem solving in children and are actively engaged in developing confident and involved learners.

The main principle that underpins BCRG service practice is the importance of relationships with the children, families and the community with whom we work. BCRG Preschool adopts a strength based and person centred approach to working with children and families. BCRG Chester Hill Preschool emphasises an inclusive environment where children build a sense of belonging and are encouraged to play, discover and learn. We are a diverse multicultural community and reflect this in our program.

### BCRG CHESTER HILL PRESCHOOL CONTINUED

The preschool has specially designed indoor and outdoor spaces and encourages children to explore and learn within a nurturing environment.

BCRG undertakes an annual Preschool census and adheres to the Start Strong funding principals with the aim to reduce fees for children from low income families. The aim is to improve affordability of early childhood education and increase the number of children participating in a quality early childhood education program in the year before school.

### **PROGRAM OVERVIEW**

- Our preschool went through an Assessment & Rating process where our service was rated against 7 quality areas within the National Quality Standard. We were rated as Exceeding in Quality Area 1 – Educational Program and Practice, and Quality Area 3 – Physical environment. The overall rating for our service is Meeting the national Quality Standard.
- Additional programs were offered to the children to extend our educational program through successful grant submissions from the Department of Education. They included Chinese Drumming Performances and Aboriginal Cultural performances.





### TREASURERS REPORT

BCRG has overcome another challenging year that was characterised by the continued presence of Covid 19 and all of the many difficulties to 'normal' work life that it brings. We managed to meet our many goals and targets through strong teamwork and excellent, trusted leadership.

Our staff completed many projects that have directly helped people weather different aspects of the pandemic and the challenges that life in our society presents.

We still maintaining a surplus this financial year, a situation we have been striving for and which gives us a much-needed stability.

We continue to flourish in our Canterbury Bankstown Council owned premises at Jacobs Street, Bankstown – premises we have enjoyed since 2019. Again we extend our continued gratitude to the Council.

Our Preschool at Chester Hill once again had full enrolment for much of this financial year. This situation would not happen without our educators' dedicated and high quality services to the children and families. We thank our excellent preschool staff for their hard work and dedication. We thank the Chester Hill Public School – whose land the Preschool sits upon - a valuable and generous friend to BCRG. I am very pleased to report that BCRG has a surplus of \$84,601 for the 2021/2022 financial year.

I would like to acknowledge our valuable funders and supporters: The Commonwealth and State Governments, The Smith Family, Canterbury Bankstown City Council, Local Clubs and the NDIS.

Apart from program funding, the Department of Communities and Justice provided additional funding opportunities during the pandemic. This funding enabled BCRG to provide critical supports, develop resources and improve technology to deliver innovative solutions to the community.

We would like to express our appreciation to the following businesses and organisations who have donated to BCRG financial and physical resources: Canterbury Bankstown Council, Rotary Club of Padstow and the Commonwealth Bank. Mr. Con Kostanti, BCRG's IT consultant, deserves special mention – a person always available 24/7 to solve any IT problems that periodically threaten our ability to do what we do – this is especially so given how much of our work had to be delivered on-line during lock downs. Thank you Con!


Thanks also to our many community supporters and collaborators and the families that trust us to run programs with them and their children across a broad range of activities.

Note 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

# Financial Reporting Framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Bankstown Community Resource Group Incorporated. The committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity as the users of the financial statements are able to obtain additional information to meet their needs.

## Statement of Compliance

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 and New South Wales legislation the Associations Incorporation Act 2009, the Charitable Fundraising Act 1991 and associated regulations and the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and

### Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

# (a) Revenue Recognition

Government and other grants are recognised when the Association obtains control or the right to receive the grant can the grant can the grant can the grant can be measured reliably. The Association does not obtain control of a grant until it has provided the services and met the conditions that make it eligible to control it. Grants received in advance are deferred as a liability and not recognised until the Association has provided the services and met the conditions.

Donations are recognised and brought to account on a cash basis when received.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to customers.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST)

# (b) Goods and Services Tax

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST), except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

# (b) Goods and Services Tax (Cont.)

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of GST. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included as a current asset or liability in the statement of financial position. Cash flows are included in the statement of cash flows on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is receivable from, or payable to, the ATO are classified as operating cash flows.

### (c) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year, together with benefits arising from wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave, which will be settled after one year, have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled plus related oncosts. Other employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

Contributions are made by the association to employee superannuation funds and are charged as expenses when incurred.

### (d) Income Tax

The association has been classified as a tax-exempt charitable institution under section 50-5 of the income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

# (e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

# (f) Property, Plant and Equipment

All Items of property, plant and equipment are fully written off in the year of purchase

### (g) Impairment

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

### Provisions Ξ

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. ### Financial assets

Financial assets are recognised initially on the date at which the association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument The association derecognises the financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows on the financial asset in a transaction in which substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred. Any interest in transferred financial assets that is created or retained by the association is recognised as a separate asset or liability. Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the statement of financial position when and only when, the association has a legal right to offset the amounts and intends either to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously,

The association has the following financial assets: loans and receivables, cash and cash equivalents and held to maturity investments. Loans and receivables are financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Such assets are recognised initially at fair value plus any directly attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition loans and receivables are measured at amorfised cost using effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

Loans and receivables comprise cash and cash equivalents and trade and other receivables.

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash balances and call deposits with original maturities of three months or less. Bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the association's cash management are included as a component of cash and cash equivalents for the purpose of the statement of cash flows. held to maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets that have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments, and it is the Association's intention to hold these investments to maturity. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method
